

Nashville Bluegrass Band performs in People's Republic

Lou Reid has left the Ricky Skaggs band to assume the guitar/lead singer seat with The Seldom Scene. During the interim between Phil Rosenthal's departure and Reid's early June arrival, Tony Rice and John Starling filled in.

Wayne Lewis completed his 30-day notice to Bill Monroe on May 18, ending the longest continuous service by any Blue Grass Boy. Lewis replaced Ralph Lewis in 1976. The current Blue Grass Boys are Blake Lewis, banjo; Tater Tate, fiddle; Johnny Montgomery, bass; and Tom Ewing, guitar.

Donna Odum of Bluegrass World in Orlando, Fla., reported that the long delayed venue will open June 19-21. A 1942 church has been converted into a fine listening room dedicated to the memory of the late Big Timber and Stanley Brothers fiddler Chubby Anthony.

Whiskey Jack, the Toronto-based blue/new grass band that has been a favorite with Canadian and Nashville Network viewers via the *Tommy Hunter Show*, has signed with In Tune Management. The transformation means the addition of a drum kit and the use of more guitars and less mandolin and banjo.

Marshall Wilborn, formerly of Whetstone Run, is the new bass player for Jimmy Martin.

Jean and Bob Cornett, who have produced the Festival of the Bluegrass in Lexington, Ky., for a number of years, have opened the Spirit of the Swanee Campground in Live Oak, Fla. They staged their first festival at that site in April; the next is slated for October 10-11.

The Lonesome River Band recorded their second album at Springfield, Virginia's Bias Studios on June 6-7 for release on Cross Current, the new label spun off by Rebel/County Records.

Also waxing at Bias recently have been Appalachian Express and The Virginia Squires. The Squires recorded four Wes Golding compositions and one by Randall Hylton for their fourth album, slated to appear on Cross Current. Squires Rickie Simkins and Sammy Sheller joined Tony Rice and Frank Poindexter on sessions for a long overdue album from Larry Rice. Like the New Quicksilver's recorded debut with Allen Bibey, it is slated for Cross Current.

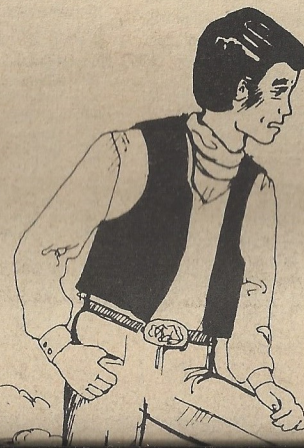
The Nashville Bluegrass Band became the first American bluegrass act to perform in the People's Republic of China. The five-man group arrived in the world's most populous nation on June 25, and departed on July 4 after playing at a picnic at the United States Embassy in Beijing (formerly known as Peking). Most of the ten-day sojourn was spent performing at the American Festival at the Sheraton Great Wall Hotel.

The Oriental junket follows the Nashville

Bluegrass Band's first European tour. The group departed May 17 for two weeks of dates in Holland, France and West Germany. Those gigs included the Angers Bluegrass Festival in France and the German festival in Gullingen. Following the success of their 1985 debut platter, *My Native Home*, Rounder Records has scheduled the release of a second album for late June.

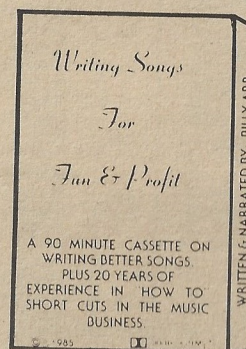
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
